Universalism revisited

Poetological, Philosophical and Historical Encounters

The main *enjeu* of this workshop is to rethink the idea of universality in a historical perspective. This rethinking is intended to allow the differentiation of different notions of universalism, and to break up the very popular idea that European modernity, and especially the Enlightenment, codified the human in the abstract without paying sufficient attention to the culturally constructed, political aspects of human existence. After the emphasis on relativism during recent decades and the cynical turn towards what was called a "clash of civilizations", it seems urgent to rethink universality, without however neglecting its imperial turn within 19th century European universalisms.
