Non-human animals are omnipresent in Greek and Latin literature: dogs accompany the hunt, horses bring warriors into battle, donkeys grind grain. They are pets or farm animals, prey or threat. But what feelings do animals trigger in humans? What abilities are attributed to the animals themselves? Are they perceived as things or as sentient subjects?

Our "Human-Animal-Studies in Classics" conference examines the representations of the emotional dimension of human-animal relations in literary and visual representations and thus contributes to an expansion of the research field of human-animal relations or human-animal-studies to include the ancient perspective.
